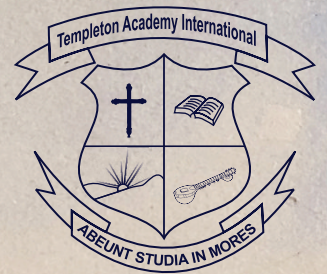
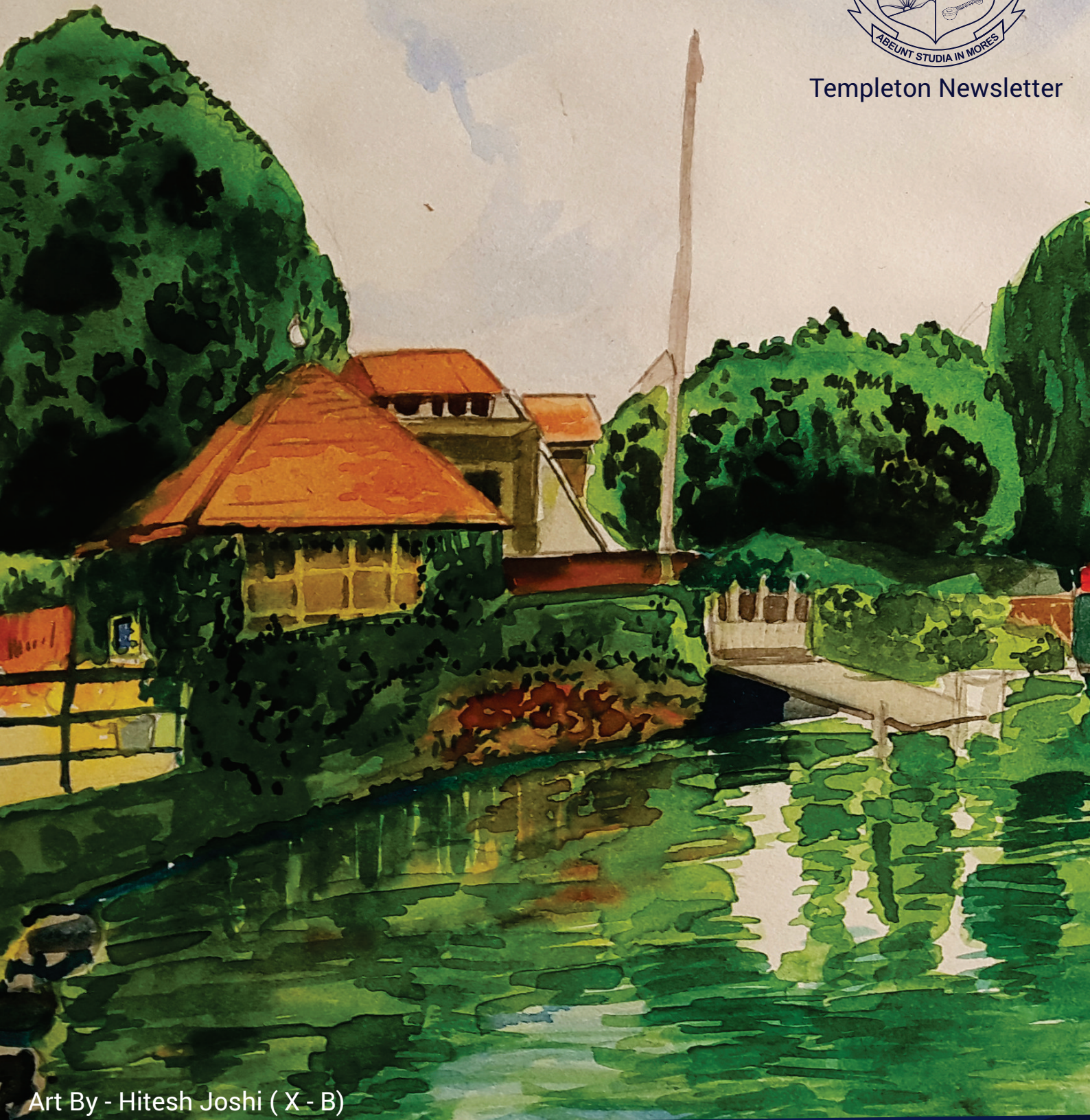

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FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

“Sharing of the Best Practices as Education Is Everybody's Business”



Every professional educators love to talk about “sharing of the best practices.” And I have witnessed it myself as I have been a professional educator for nearly thirty years and I have often used that term myself.

The scoring ground here, of course, is to point out that my practices are the best because they work in my classroom. This is actually one of the very valid parameters, nevertheless as a practitioner, I ought to be up to date, incorporating all new approaches to education that reflect new dynamics in the workforce and society—and more so as we know much now about how students learn than we knew when I started out.

At Templeton Academy International, Nainital, discovering and disseminating best practices has been a hallmark of our journey since its inception. We started by declaring, based on our own experience as students, that we knew what did not work and we were determined to stop perpetuating those practices immediately.

Our search for good practice led us first to good theory. The irony, of course, is that “progressive” education is not new; rather, we are returning to a learner-centric approach to individualized attention so that the generations of young people do not fall victims to the factory model of the Industrial Revolution.

We have come a long way on our journey, and now the disseminating of the best practices works in both directions: we continue to seek input from a new generation of practitioners and we also share what

we have learned with others who look on to us, increasingly, for a model of progressive, student-centric, expeditionary and hands-on education.

Most recently, we teamed up with AIESEC Delhi for GIP-Global Internship Program on inviting international interns to coach and mentor our young learners. Maja Djuricic –an intern from Department of Pedagogy, University of Vienna showcased everything we believe about progressive education i.e. “preparing for exams and learning are both necessary, but they are two different things.”

She kept our elementary educators spellbound as she probed their understanding—and misunderstanding—during her interface with them where, she told them, she was not as interested in the right answer as she was in their thinking process. “Students must make mistakes,” she told them. “This is how we move forward.”

Making mistakes and being honest and reflective enough to learn from them is, in itself, an example of the best practice. During our Winter Study Camp, our high school educators collaborated with Extramarks Live for the academic rigor of our senior resident scholars. They shared our success as well as what we have learned from “costly adventures” with technology in the classroom. Their message was simple and consistent: “It isn’t about the technology, it’s about the pedagogy.”

In the meantime, I took a series of interactive session for teaching of English as a second language for the middle and high school as I myself have been an ESL educator throughout my career—and the material



and approach I shared came directly from my work experience of the most successful best practices, later I introduced these educators to those learning outcomes, writing traits, writing process (including peer and self-editing and multiple drafts), differentiated assignments and the integration of reading strategies into content areas, from social studies to science to literature.

On an even larger scale, of course, a few months back I had an interaction with a renowned champion of authentic learning, Dr. S Ravindaran, who addressed an auditorium filled with school heads, policy makers and writers of curriculum at The Indian Habitat Center Delhi where he challenged the audience to "re-imagine schools".

Such schools range from elite to entirely inclusive, traditional to cutting-edge. At Templeton Academy International, Nainital we believe in implementing the best practices of teaching and learning and that's the reason, we are organizing Author's Workshop in April 2015 in association with Scholastic India where in our young resident scholars will have an interface with an author of repute to share and learn from his or her domain of expertise hands on.

With this very intent our middle school students would be undergoing two weeks of theatre workshop to prepare and present a stage production based upon one of their prescribe novel or drama before their parents and peers in May 2015. Such an exercise would help our young learners acquire hands on experience of Script Writing, Prop Making, Costume Designing, Dialogue Delivery, Acting, Background Score, Expression and Confidence.

In June we will invite School Principals from all hill schools for the educational conference, to be held here. The conference would bring a consortium of practitioners together with one objective: to ensure that "no child has to earn the right to belong." This is a powerful vision that we can embrace, with practices that we can also share but much we have yet to learn.

Perhaps the most significant example of our determination to share the best practices came alive with the launch of our Global Village Meet, in February 2015. With an influx of international interns across the globe, as well as the practitioners in our own school exchanging and sharing their domain of expertise under one roof. The goal is to prepare educators to teach by combining theory with immediate application, under the careful mentoring of an experienced educational leader who can demonstrate—you guessed it right —the best practices in a real-live classroom context.

Another feat in this direction was the project called –Sky Observation Night in March 2015 where in a team of Astro-physicists from BITS, Pilani visited our campus and helped our young scholars learn to build to assemble high end double reflection telescope, do the star gazing at night , record their observations , reflect upon their findings and present their learning outcome to their peers and educators.

So the lifelong learning continues, and we keep growing as practitioners. The real practitioners who benefit from all of this dynamic synergy are, ultimately, our own team of educators—and, of course, our young resident scholars!!!

GLOBAL VILLAGE MEET

With the advancement of technology even the universe is being explored at a very rapid pace, the day is not far away that we will be able to meet people from the other world. TRENDY MUSIC AROUND

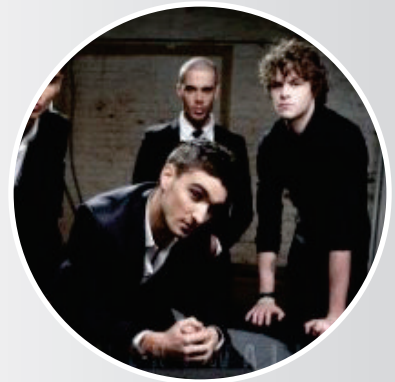

What is Self-Confidence?

Two main things contribute to self-confidence: self-efficacy and self-esteem.

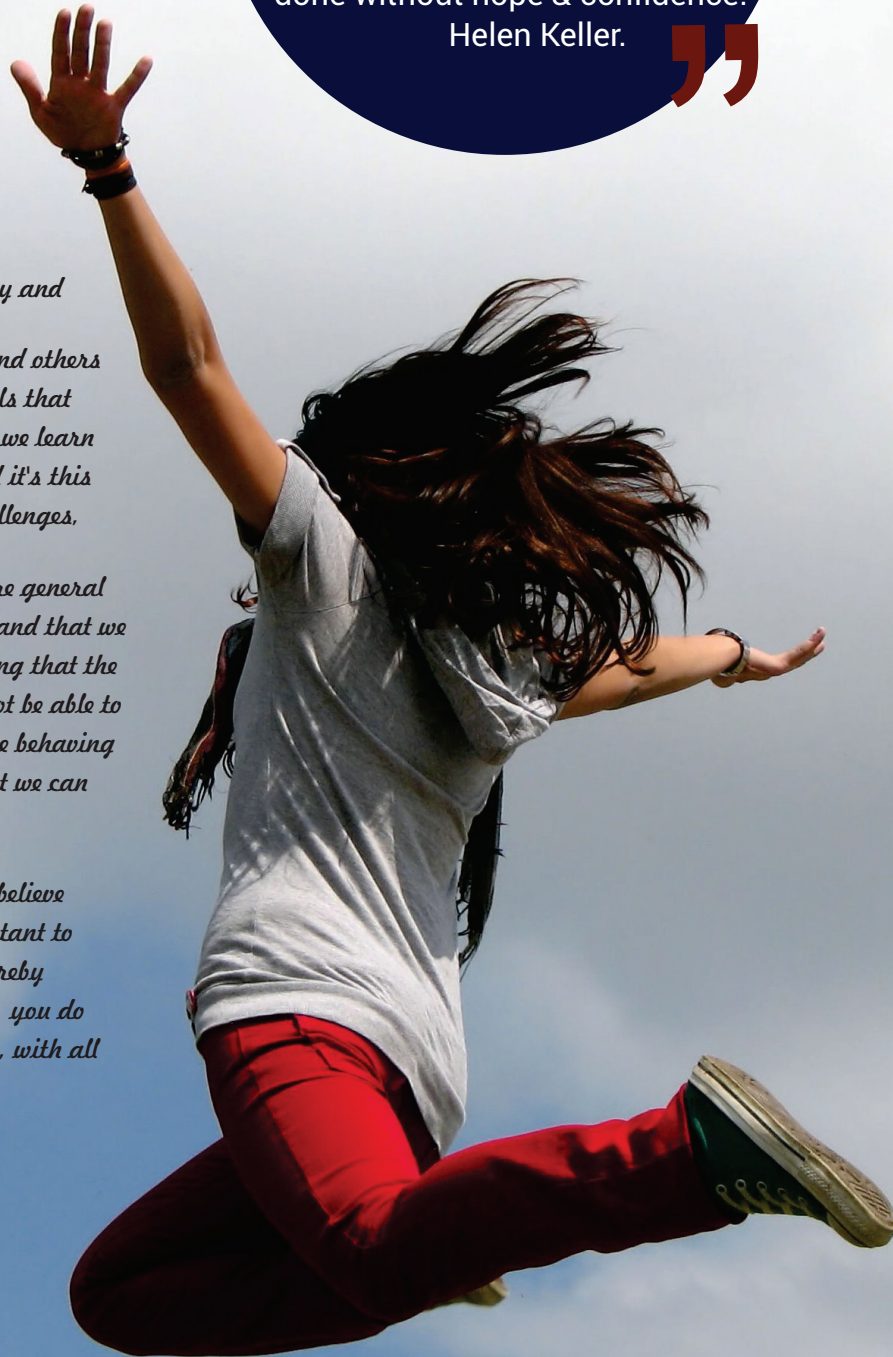
We gain a sense of self-efficacy when we see ourselves (and others similar to ourselves) mastering skills and achieving goals that matter in those skill areas. This is the confidence that, if we learn and work hard in a particular area, we will succeed; and it's this type of confidence that leads people to accept difficult challenges, and persist in the face of setbacks.

This overlaps with the idea of self-esteem, which is a more general sense that we can cope with what's going on in our lives, and that we have a right to be happy. Partly, this comes from a feeling that the people around us approve of us, which we may or may not be able to control. However, it also comes from the sense that we are behaving virtuously, that we are competent at what we do, and that we can compete successfully when we put our minds to it.

Some people believe that self-confidence can be built with affirmations and positive thinking. At Mind Jools, we believe that there's some truth in this, but that it's just as important to build self-confidence by setting and achieving goals – thereby building competence. Without this underlying competence, you do not have self-confidence: you have shallow over-confidence, with all of the issues, upset and failure that this brings.

Top 5 tips for building self-confidence are:

1. Look at what you have already achieved
2. Think of things you are good at
3. Set some goals
4. Talk yourself up
5. Get a hobby

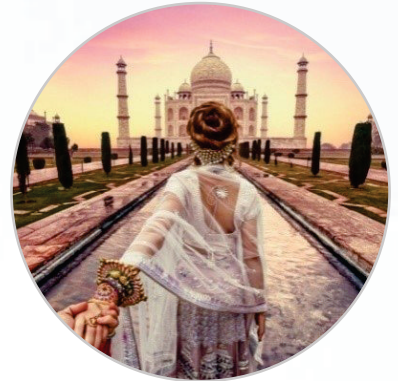

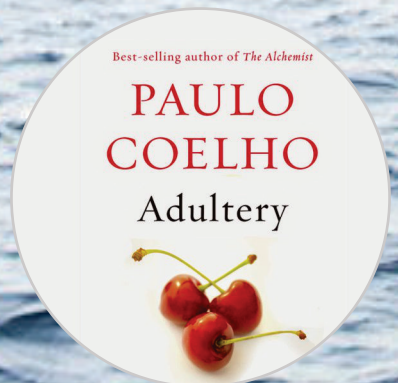
